

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


Institute of Medicine Core Competencies in Patient Outcomes

- Provide patient centered care identify, respect and care about patients' differences, expressed needs; LISTEN: inform, educate; SHARE decision making and management; continuously advocate disease prevention, wellness.....

Dose of Dialysis and Volume Status






Dose of Dialysis and Volume Status

- CCHTs always in the frontline = wealth of information shared by patients
- More CCHTs vs RNs
- 1. know patients' tolerance to UF rate/goal
- 2. suggest change in target weight
- 3. suggest extending treatment or extra treatment for UF only
- 4. educate on fluid and sodium restrictions

- Ensuring prescribed blood flow rate
- Preventing intradialytic hypotension
- Preventing cramps
- Cramping known to affect adequacy

Mineral Metabolism and Bone Disease



- CCHTs can educate on binder/diet adherence
- Some patients snack and drink during treatment
- Observe type of food and drink
- Observe patient taking binder

Anemia

Vascular Access

- Observe for dialyzer clearance
- Suggest change in anticoagulant therapy
- Observation of access site
- Cannulation issues
- Post dialysis access bleed time
- Cannulation of new access



Infection Control

Emerging Roles

- Hand Hygiene
- Environmental
- Encourage patient to wash access prior to getting to HD chair
- Medication preparation (Heparin, Lidocaine)
- Observing aseptic technique
- Isolation practices

- Participate un Unit Base Councils
- Participate in performance improvement projects
- Precepting new CCHTs
